

## CURRICULUM VITAE

### Jurij Bajec



Prof. Jurij Bajec, Ph.D. is a special advisor at the Economics Institute and a full professor at the Faculty of Economics, University of Belgrade.

He was born in Brežice, Slovenia in 1946. He finished elementary education and Gymnasium in Ljubljana, Bonn and Belgrade. He graduated in Belgrade in 1968, received his M.Sc. in 1972 and defended his doctoral thesis in 1975.

He was elected an assistant at the Faculty of Economics in Belgrade in 1969, an assistant professor in 1976 and an associate professor in 1982. He became a full professor in 1989. He was on vocational training in England (in 1977 and in the period 1979-1980) at the Institute of Development Studies, University of Sussex as a research associate at the Economic Development and Underdevelopment Programme. In 1984 he visited the United States university centers and departments of comparative economic systems. He has been teaching Contemporary economic systems since 1969 and Economics of the public sector since 2002. He also lectured at the Faculty of Economics in Banja Luka, Faculty of Economics and Law in Novi Sad and Addis Ababa University in Ethiopia. Within post-graduate studies he lectures: Public sector management, Economic development theory and Competition Policy. He is a member of Presidency of the Serbian Association of Economists and a member of the Academy of Economic Sciences of the Scientific Association of Economists of Serbia.

He was a project leader and a member of expert teams for preparation of strategic development documents, economic reforms and restructuring programmes in Serbia and, inter alia, a coordinator of the development of "Serbian Post-Crisis Economic Growth and Development Model 2011-2020". In the period 2008-2012 he was an economic advisor to Prime Minister of the Republic of Serbia.

Prof. Bajec, Ph.D. participated in numerous international conferences and round tables in England, Germany, Austria, Italy, the Netherlands, the Czech Republic, Russia, Romania, Bulgaria and Hungary. He is the author of numerous articles and other texts of which some are published abroad.

He published the following books: Social development and the possibilities of its measurement (1977), Developing countries (1983), Introduction to a comparative analysis of contemporary economic systems (1989), Market, capital, ownership (editor with Z. Pjanic) (1991), Comparative economic policies, co-author (1992), Contemporary economic systems – an introduction to the study (1992) and Contemporary economic systems, co-author (1993, 1997 and 2001).
